pionships. In one of the windiest regattas in memory, Stanger held on Saturday in windy conditions that even saw him retire a race to rig a smaller sail and when the wind let up a notch on Sunday, he clinched his victory.

Saturday had a west wind that started at a mild 10-15 in the morning and built to a solid 15-30 in the afternoon with a few gusts guaranteed to send a few overboard. A few windsurfers used shortboards, notably Phil Duvic on a flapper and an 8.2 sail, while others opted for a longboard but with a smaller sail in the 6s. The occasional lulls and the amount of upwind work in a restricted bay pointed out the difficulty in sailing shortboards, although Phillip did

Kevin Osburn and Fred Dey set courses that took advantage of the conditions. The windward legs were reasonable and the downwind legs had lots of opportunity to let it loose and jibe a bit.

Sunday brought more typical but still breezy conditions that put the premium again on longboard skill and the more experienced sailors showed their stuff.

Club member Lisa Kloepfer was on hand Saturday night (as well as serving





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
# TECH TALK: Power VS. WIND DIRECTION

How much power do you generate when sailing? Dr. Peter Somlo who so kindly provided us with last month's Tech Talk has sent us this nice graph showing his model's output. Now you know why you go so fast on a broad reach; that's when you are generating the most power- about 1.5 metric h.p. (and since you don't need a lot of lift from your fin, relatively low drag, too).

Next month, Dr. Somlo will tell us how big a metric horse is and just how he fit one and half of the beasts on his board. Then again, I'd rather not figure out the half part- I still remember the original *Godfather* movie.\*


