




The Best Southeastern Spot You've Never Sailed

There's a place where the current runs against the prevailing wind. Where the 8 mile fetch allows chop to become swellsmooth and evenly spaced. Jetskis are rare but you do have to watch for the occasional barge. On the inside, smooth water allows intermediates room to play but past the sandbar, swells have been known to go head high in a big blow.

There are such places: The Tennessee River in northern Alabama. The Tennessee Valley Authority created large reservoirs to electrify the area during the Depression. Because of the sparser rural population and the relatively open nature of these lakes, they don't bear the heavy recreational traffic that Atlanta's lakes do. But their characteristics make them ideal for ringing out the small sails of your quiver. My interest in these lakes stems from my in-laws living in Huntsville, more famous for its association with NASA. You cross the Tennessee to get there and on this side of Huntsville, it runs SW to NE with a big ridge (Sand Mtn.) on one side. On the other side lie the better candidates for those prevailing westerly winds we experience in the Southeast. Just to the east of Huntsville is Lake Wheeler which has at one point about a 15 mile fetch from the west and is about 1-2 miles wide. That's the good news. The bad news is it's tough finding a decent launch. Much of the shore is private, industrial (all those barges are going somewhere) or rip-rapped. A couple

of good launches do exist however.


The North Alabama Boardsailing Association website turned me onto one of them and on Saturday of Memorial Day Weekend, I sailed Cowsford.

It was a big sail on a shortboard kind of day, but after launching off a grassy bank, I had about a mile reach to the middle of the river. There were very few boats out there; most of the time, I had the place to myself. The outside jibe was easy but the inside tough as the riprap on the shore echoed the chop.

Cowsford is near Brown's Ferry Nuclear Plant (Cherynobl is Russian for Brown's Ferry). You notice all the signs on the local roads showing the Brown's Ferry Evacuation route. Also, the launch is under enormous 300 ft. transmission towers. It's kind of eerie but you get used to them.

I met one windsurfer there who told me that while Cowsford is good on a west, but the windshadow on NW goes out 150 yds and the locals go just below Wheeler Dam. He gave me just enough info to hunt for it the next day.

Sunday brought a forecast for 85 degrees and a lake wind advisory. "Pinch me, I'm dreaming", I thought. After doing the family thing, I got permission to scoot westward. I contemplated putting in near Decatur but was pulled further westward because ailing alone isn't that fun- I'd rather be around other



windsurfers.

A kind local gent gave me the last bit of directions I needed as I found Wheeler Dam but no windsurfers. They hang out near a restaurant, The Point, further upriver. I wheeled into the parking lot and found that below the restaurant is a campground on a grassy point. This is where the locals hang and Tony Peebles runs a windsurfing school. They welcomed me and gave me the lay of the land. 6.5 was the call. It was flat out to the sandbar (about 1/2 mile) and after that, the fun began in the channel. The locals don't rig small, it was a solid 15 with gusts in the



20s. I plugged my trusty 6.8 race sail into my slalom board and went out. After beach starting, I caught a puff and skimmed to the bar, under water in springtime. Then out in the channel, the fun began. Smooth swells about 2 feet high favored my better side- port tack. I just picked a nice swell and pointed everything up.

It was an easy reach back in if you needed to tuneup or just catch a breather. About 8 windsurfers were out of all abilities. And as if on cue, during one gusty period, I saw a barge heading upstream. I've heard about barges so I chose to jibe a little shorter for a few runs. Later in the afternoon, I was inducted into the Fraternal Order of Broken Booms but luckily on the way out. Just a tense run in on the good side till I could rig my other boom. I sailed till dark,aiming for that fine point between squeezing everything out of the day and not getting into too much trouble for being late getting home.

Tony tells me that on the 4.5 days, the swell gets really big, especially when Wheeler Dam is releasing water in the spring. "You could hide cars out there." I believe him. On the day I was there the swell was smooth and 2 ft high. You could play on it and jibe off it, unlike Lanier's

or the Bahamas were like before American tourists descended en mass. The majority of vacationers were Europeans. Out of the 30 or so people I actually talked with, no more than five were American. They pretty much thought I was nutty to be down there for any less than two weeks,

Dept. of If: Can Dale Earnhardt, Jr. Jibe?

A recent article in American Windsurfer had an interview with an engineer from an Indy 500 team racer. He was pretty convinced that auto racing and windsurfing had a lot in common. I've been interested in auto racing all my life, so I thought this was pretty cool. However, after a little thought, I figured out that the 2 sports are not really that similar. Then I began thinking about what auto racing might be like if it was REALLY like windsurfing.

• Races would be held on an open space, almost like a giant parking lot, with almost no barriers. Racers would not know where the course or track was until just before the race started. Sometimes the course would be changed or shortened in the middle of a race.

• Racers would not be allotted a specific amount of fuel before the race. Instead, the fuel supply for any given day would be based on random chance. Even stranger, fuel would be lying around the track, and there would be more fuel in some places then others. • On days when very little fuel was available, racers would drive really big cars, with really big engines. On days when there was lots of fuel, racers would switch to smaller cars with smaller engines.

• Some races would be cancelled because not enough fuel was available. Sometimes this would happen in the middle of the race, and all of the cars would slow down, stop and even have to be towed off.

• On days when there wasn't much fuel, racers could increase the speed of their cars getting out of their car and pushing.

• The engine size (or horsepower) available might be changed unexpectedly in the middle of the race. Racers driving big cars would suddenly crash if lots of fuel/power became available. Drivers of small cars would sink to the bottom of the track, if the fuel supply or power suddenly was reduced.

• At some race tracks, spectators would be allowed to drive their cars in the middle of the course anytime they liked. Trucks gether from my crappy Spanish interpretation).

and motorscooters would willy-nilly drive through totally disregarding the speeding cars. In extreme cases, state troopers could interrupt a race and ask for a driver's license and proof of registration.

• Racers would not have to run a qualifying lap to determine the pole position. Instead, the pole would be decided based on who was best at driving around in circles or parallel parking before the green flag.

• Instead of watching the race from bleachers outside the track, the race directors would go out in the middle of track, sit on a bus and observe.


• Races would only be one or two laps; and a number of races would be run on a weekend, the winner not necessarily being the one with the fastest car.

• If two cars collided, the one with more fuel (or closest to the fuel supply) would be at fault.

• Cars driving downhill would have to yield to cars going uphill. Cars going uphill could not drive a straight line. Instead, they would have to serpentine, serpentine.

• Drafting would be totally ineffective. In fact, being behind another car would slow the second car down 20-30%.
